Their eyes met.

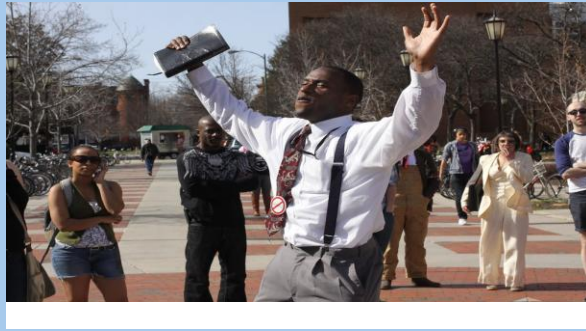
David pointed directly at him.
